Such inequality has broad consequences that affect not just women, but the entire community in impoverished regions.

Women remain less likely to participate in the labour market than men and more unemployed than men. Globally, women are paid less than men. Women bear disproportionate responsibility for unpaid care and domestic work. Unpaid care work is essential to the functioning of the economy, but often goes uncounted and unrecognized.

The International Centre for Research on Women (ICRW) has studied the ways in which the improved economic status of women positively affects children, families and societies.

Places where women have more social mobility and control over their finances also have lower child mortality rates, more transparent businesses and faster economic growth. In addition, children's educational opportunities and job prospects are largely contingent upon their mothers' incomes and financial stability.
